Mark the studs of the wall as your first step.

You'll want to make sure to secure the planks to the studs whenever possible.



Remove the strapping from plank kit.

Layout on the floor to get an idea for how you want them to appear on the wall and where your cuts will be made.

Distribute different colored planks evenly and not next to one another for the best look.

As you plan your layout, the best look is to design-in cut; meaning that you don't want a lot of long planks or long planks adjacent to one another. Cuts should be staggered like brick work. These planks are carefully made to reduce (as much as possible) any gaps between planks.

As with all truly reclaimed wood, nail holes, knots, and cracks exist allowing the wall color to show through. We suggest painting the wall a darker color before installing the planks.

Once you have determined your ideal layout, we suggest beginning by working from the bottom-left of the wall or surface you will be covering. For these instructions, we will assume you are covering a wall and will proceed from the bottom left. Apply mastic adhesive to the wall a couple of rows at a time if you are using it, if not proceed with nailing the planks to the wall.

Finishing and Corner Treatment



45° Angle Joint

Prior to securing adjoining planks to the wall when you reach a corner, make your 45° angle cut on the joining end of the plank.

The face of the plank will be longer than the inside surface of the plank.



Lap Joint

Cut the planks with square edges (chop saw) longer than the length needed (the thickness of the plank) for the proud face.

Staining

We think these are beautiful as-is. However, you may choose to add color to the planks either before or after installation.

Sealing

There is no need to apply sealant to your planks. This material is at least 100 years old and has withstood the test of time. Wood needs to breathe. If you do seal the planks we suggest a water-based clear matte polyurethane.
